Bull buyer's checklist

David Gazda, American Angus Association regional manager for Florida, Georgia and South Carolina, offers the following checklist:

- ✓ **MARKET:** Identify the market you are producing for.
- ☑ HERD PERFORMANCE: Know your herd performance so you can select bulls that provide directional change and allow you to meet your production goals.
- ✓ **SECURING SEEDSTOCK:** Begin searching for bulls a minimum of 60-90 days prior to breeding season in order to purchase the bull(s) that meet your production goals and needs.
- ✓ **SEEDSTOCK SUPPLIER:** Identify successful, reputable seedstock programs in your region that will assist you in genetic selection and marketing.
- ☑ **BEFORE THE SALE:** Identify multiple bulls that meet selection criteria, then rank in purchase preference, assigning a price you would be willing to pay to each individual. Arrange to see bulls in advance or have someone evaluate bulls for you prior to sale. Videos generally do not show foot conformation. Make sure the bull has received all needed vaccinations, and has passed a complete breeding soundness exam.
- ✓ **AFTER THE SALE:** Make sure you have received a properly transferred registration paper within 60 days.

through bulls offered by private treaty. Oklahoma State University's Mark Johnson will discuss how to find a balance for your cow herd, including how to apply expected progeny differences (EPDs), what to look for phenotypically and how many bulls you need to turn out to cover your cow herd. Jill Peine, ruminant nutritionist for Ridley Block Operations, will cover bull fertility, including a bull's nutritional needs and using a breeding soundness exam (sometimes referred to as a BSE).

We hope we can make you more certain of a return for your investment in Angus genetics.
