These designated letters are an easy option to use in conjunction with numbers when permanently identifying animals. For example, F001 and F002 could designate the first two calves born into your herd in the year 2018.

Using the international letter code is optional for Angus breeders.

### Phenotype and genotype show

National Junior Angus Association (NJAA) members will have another competitive venue at the 2018 Eastern Regional Junior Angus Show (ERJAS) June 14-16 in Lima, Ohio. The Phenotype and Genotype Show (PGS) creates an additional competition while allowing junior members to learn the value of expected progeny differences (EPDs) as part of the process in selecting quality seedstock.

A judge will utilize a scoring system that requires both phenotypes and genotypes to be considered in evaluation. Results from the system will be a composite score where the genotypic EPDs and phenotypic placings will be equally weighted.

The same judge will evaluate the EPDs and the phenotype classes. For more information, contact the

# Foot score EPDs enter research phase

Angus Genetics Inc. (AGI) announced Jan. 30 the release of two research expected progeny difference (EPD) values for evaluating foot structure.

The American Angus Association had compiled approximately 12,000 data points since it began receiving foot scores in 2015, with members reporting two scores — one for claw set and one for foot angle. Both scores are based on a scale from 1 to 9, with 5 being ideal.

AGI Director of Genetic Research Stephen Miller said the collaboration with the membership in collecting foot scores allowed steady advancement toward a foot score research EPD.

"Angus breeders have completed a tremendous amount of data reporting in such a short period of time. This is truly a testament to their commitment toward genetic progress," Miller said. "We are absolutely thrilled to begin the process of rolling this breakthrough out to the membership." Last summer, AGI initiated a research analysis on yearling foot scores with the collected data. The analysis reported moderate heritability estimates for both claw set (0.25) and foot angle (0.25). Since the preliminary analysis, AGI has worked alongside the Association's Information Systems (IS) team to develop a genetic evaluation model to predict foot score.

A research EPD is a precursor to a production EPD, serving as a one-time analysis delivered to the membership and enabling the Association to get meaningful feedback from Angus producers. Unlike a production EPD, a research EPD does not get updated weekly but can be updated periodically as more data flows into the database. The more data are collected, the more robust the evaluation becomes, and the sooner the research EPD can be moved into production.

AGI Director of Genetic Service Kelli Retallick said it is important producers continue to submit quality, consistent data. "Though we are getting closer to a production EPD, we encourage members to continue sending in data," Retallick said. "Consistency of scoring within a producer's herd is key, and, luckily, we have a variety of resources here at the Association to help."

Currently, producers submit two foot-score data points — claw set and foot angle. During the research phase, AGI found that only a low genetic correlation (0.22) exists between the two traits. Because of the low correlation, scores are evaluated as separate traits and separate EPDs, termed Claw Set EPD and Foot Angle EPD.

Claw Set and Foot Angle EPDs published in the first research report are provided on artificial insemination (AI) sires that possess accuracy values greater than 0.40.

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
