Producers Honored

Several Angus producers were recognized at the 2002 Beef Improvement Federation (BIF) Annual Meeting and Research Symposium in Omaha, Neb., July 10-13. **Richard McClung**, manager of Wehrmann Angus Ranch, New Market, Va., was elected BIF president for 2002-2003. **S.R. Through detailed recordkeeping and stringent culling, the Griffiths have developed an efficient, performance-based commercial herd. They calve about 250 Angus and high-percentage commercial Red Angus cows. Artificial insemination (AI) is used on all cows and heifers.

Martin and **Mary Jorgensen**, Ideal, S.D., received the Pioneer Award, recognizing their lasting contributions to the improvement of beef cattle. The Jorgensens are pioneers in the development of innovative management practices and the implementation of new technologies. They were one of the first to use integrated resource management (IRM) techniques, and Martin served as the first chairman of the National IRM Coordinating Committee.

Both **Evans** and **Galen Fink**, Manhattan, Kan., were honored with the Continuing Service Award, recognizing their contributions to the beef industry. The Evans ranch consists of approximately 5,000 acres of rolling hills and fertile creek bottoms, which is home to 500 brood cows, mostly purebred Angus.
