# VEST RANCHES WINS TOP HONOR

# BIF names Angus-Charolais operation 2020 Commercial Producer of the Year.

ard work and humility have been defining traits of the Vest family since Bill Vest ventured to West Texas in 1887. It took every ounce of hard work and humility to homestead and graze cattle in the rough country of that part of the world. The hard work of more than a century was recognized when Vest Ranches was selected the 2020 Beef Improvement Federation (BIF) Commercial Producer of the Year.

The national award is presented annually to a commercial cow-calf producer to recognize dedication to improving the beef industry at the commercial level. Nominated by the American Angus Association and the American-International Charolais Association, Vest Ranches received the award during BIF's

virtual conference in June.

"We give honor and credit to the Lord, who is a big part of our daily life and operation," said Ty Watkins, Vest Ranches general manager. "We're blessed with a great family, including those who work for us, neighbors and others who contribute daily to our success."

West Texas isn't the easiest place to raise cattle, but on Vest Ranches, the management practices, innovative tools and excellent stewardship practices have helped the operation be efficient and progressive. Every detail of their land, cattle and business is attended to with extraordinary precision. That attention to detail and leadership are defining characteristics of Vest

Ty and wife Samann Vest-Watkins, a fourth-generation rancher, have employed a variety of programs and systems to help their mostly Angus herd not only survive, but thrive, in the tough landscape.

Severe drought in 2011 tested their resiliency, but the couple was able to adjust and continue to improve despite the conditions. The Vest Ranches herd has rebuilt to 1,200 head of commercial Angus and Charolais cattle that work hard without sacrificing condition and productivity.

A unique feeding program, 75-day breeding season, December calving, and management of limited forage and water resources, all while improving rangelands and wildlife habitat, set Vest Ranches apart.

Short-term goals of the ranch include yearly improved carcass quality, improved breeding and calving percentages, tightened heifer-selection criteria, 50%-55% body weight at weaning, improved understanding and ability to turn data into information in a timely manner, and improved docility in the herd.

Long-term goals include continuously improving matings, achieving 100% Prime carcasses, passing on a profitable and functional ranch to the fifth generation, and reducing cow size to 1,250 pounds (lb.).

Vest Ranches is a member of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association (TSCRA), the National Cutting Horse Association and the American Quarter Horse Association (AQHA). Locally, Samann and Ty are 32-year members of First Baptist Church of Monahans, which Samann's greatgrandmother helped establish in 1900. Ty currently serves on the Childress County Appraisal District Agricultural Advisory Board and the Texas Parks and Wildlife Advisory Board, Mule Deer Advisory Committee.

Yon Family Farms' commitment and progressive approach led to their being named Seedstock Producer of the Year by the Beef

Improvement Federation (BIF). The national award is presented on an annual basis to recognize an operation's dedication to improving the beef industry at the seedstock level.

The family-owned operation started in 1996, when Kevin and Lydia Yon purchased 100 acres and 100 Angus cows. Today the operation is still managed by Kevin and Lydia, with the help of
